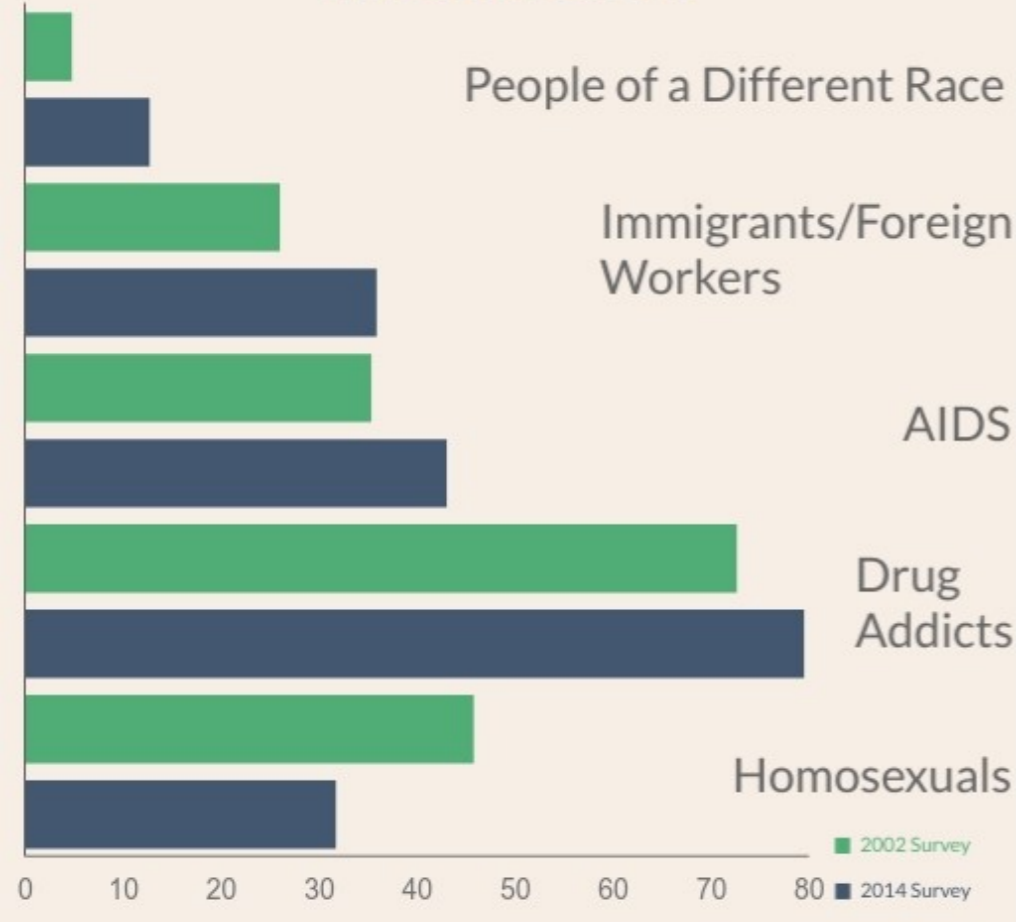


Stereotypical Singaporeans

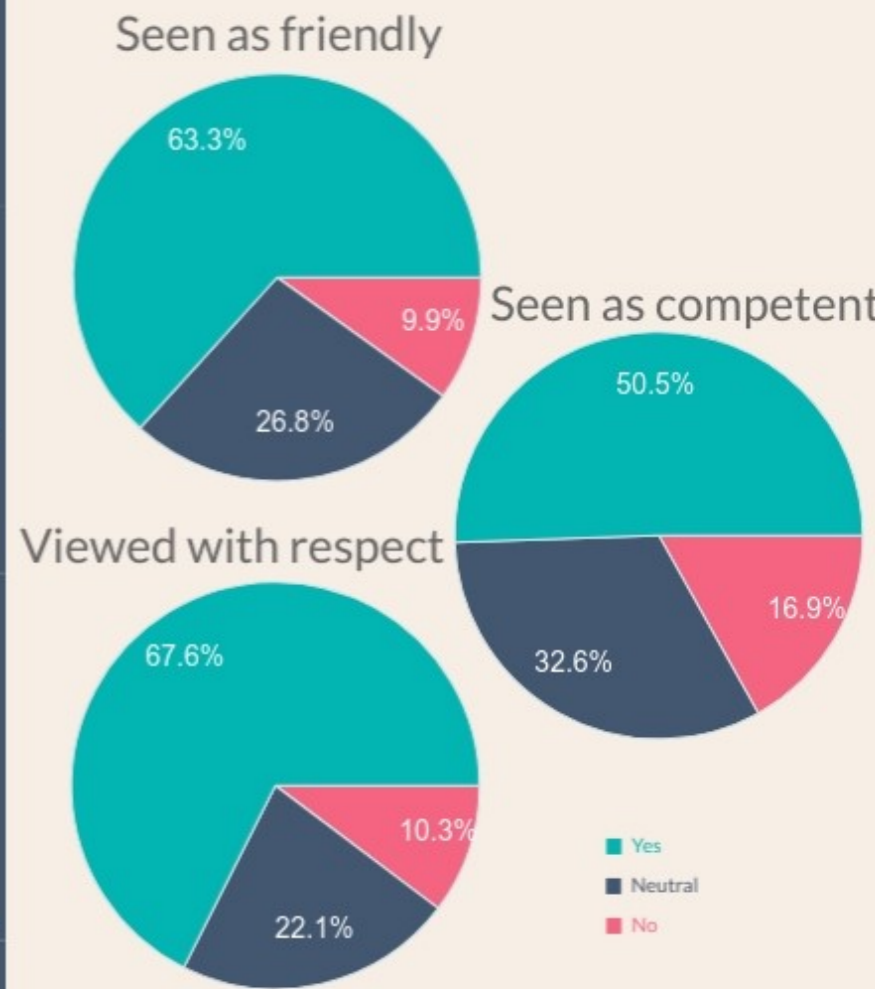
WHO WE DO NOT WANT AS OUR NEIGHBOURS?



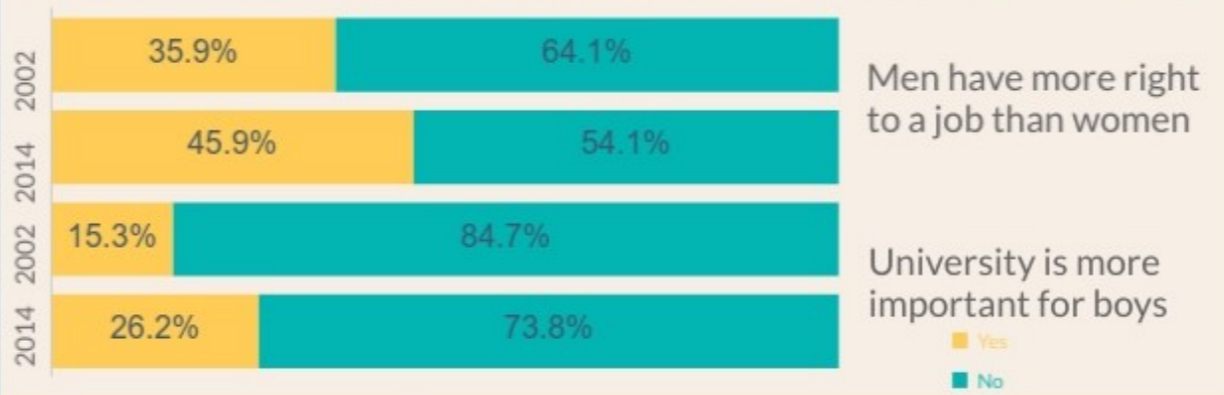
SHOULD SINGAPOREANS BE GIVEN EMPLOYMENT PRIORITY?



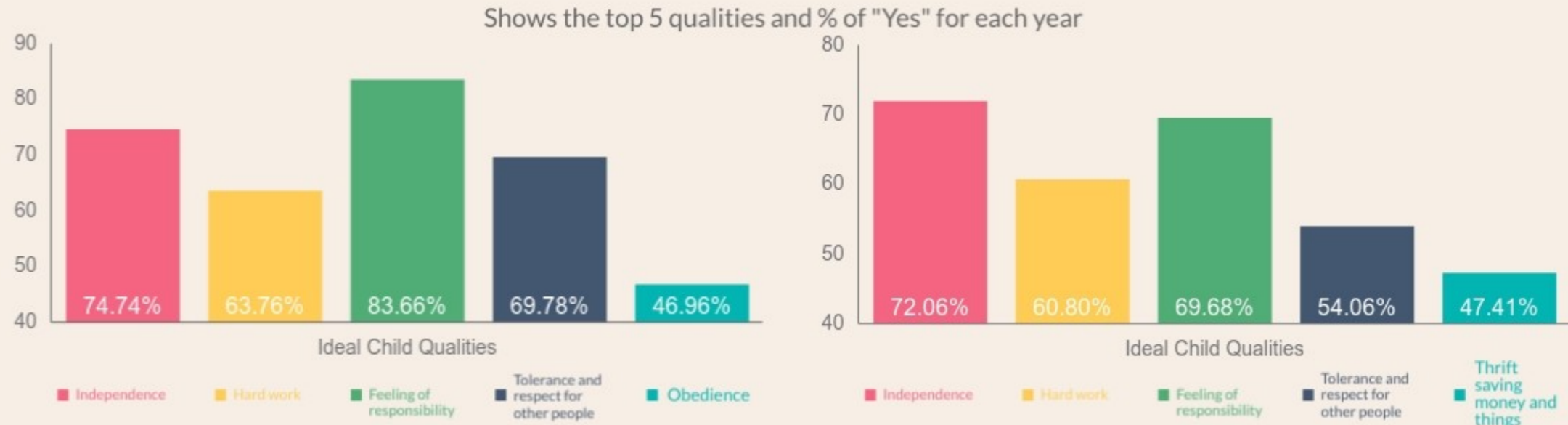
HOW DO WE VIEW PEOPLE OVER 70?

Singaporeans have generally become less stereotypical and expectant over the span of 12 years between 2002 and 2014.
