8.1 ACADEMIC CALENDAR

The SUSS Academic Year consists of 2 semesters, with each semester made up of 2 terms.

8.2 COURSE SCHEDULE

Each 5 credit units course is taught over 6 weekly 3-hour seminars and each 2.5 credit unit course is taught over 3 weekly 3-hour seminars. The frequency of the class for a 5 credit units course is once a week. Given SUSS's flipped learning pedagogy, students are encouraged to independently maintain 6 to 8 hours of self-study per course on a weekly basis. There are no large lectures held in SUSS.

A course in SUSS is worth either 2.5 or 5 credit units each. It is recommended for students to participate in a minimum of 3 courses (approximately 15 credit units) and maximum of 6 courses (approximately 30 credit units) in each semester.

9.1 AVAILABLE COURSES

9.2 FLIPPED CLASSROOM PEDAGOGY

SUSS adopts the flipped classroom approach where class time is re-purposed for inquiry, application, and assessment to better meet the needs of individual learners. Students gain control of the learning process by reviewing course material before face-to-face class time, using readings, pre-recorded video lectures, or research assignments. During face-to-face sessions, instructors become facilitators of the learning process by helping students work through problems individually and in groups.

9.3 PRE-COURSE QUIZ (PCOQ) AND PRE-CLASS QUIZ (PCQ)

A Pre-Course Quiz (PCOQ) is an assessment that forms part of the prerequisites before the start of most courses. Selected courses require students to complete a Pre-Class Quiz (PCQ) before the start of each class session. Students are to obtain at least a 60% score (up to 3 tries) before they are allowed to read the courses. Self-learning resources will be provided so that you may be better prepared for these quizzes.

9.4 COURSE ASSESSMENT

The course assessment consists of a few components, which may include a Tutor-Marked Assignment (TMA) which is an individual assignment component, a Group-Based Assignment (GBA) which is a group assignment and an examinable component. The examinable component may take the form of a written examination, an End Of-Course Assessment (ECA) or dissertation, project presentation or other form as specified by the course.



Credit & Grading System

SUSS uses a 5-point GPA system to track a student's progress at programme level over the duration of study.

In accordance with the student exchange agreement with our partner universities, exchange students are not required to pay tuition fees to SUSS. However, other administrative fees are applicable i.e. Student's Pass (Visa), Miscellaneous Fee etc.

Application Process

13.1 ELIGIBILITY

Interested applicants should:

- Have completed at least 1 semester of undergraduate studies before enrolment at SUSS and must continue to be registered at your home university throughout your exchange at SUSS.
- Not be in your graduating semester or year while on exchange at SUSS.
- Have a minimum GPA of 3.0 over a 5-point scale.
- Have proficiency in English in order to benefit from your studies at SUSS. The medium of instruction at SUSS is English (except for certain courses).

Your IELTS (Academic) score should minimally be 6.5, or your TOEFL score should be 85 (Internet-based), 237 (computer-based) or 580 (paper-based).

13.2 STUDENT PASS

All international students must have a valid Student's Pass during the period of study at SUSS. Admission is contingent upon successful application of Student's Pass. SUSS Office of Global Programmes (OGP) will facilitate your Student's Pass application via the Immigration & Checkpoints Authority (ICA) Student's Pass Online Application & Registration (SOLAR) system.

The Student's Pass enables the student to live and study in Singapore, as well as serves as a multiple-entry visa into Singapore (*subject to terms & conditions*).

IMPORTANT

By regulation, Student's Pass holders (exchange & visiting students) are strictly not permitted to undertake any form of internship or work (regardless paid or unpaid) during their term of studies in Singapore. Offenders are subject to punishment in accordance with Singapore laws.
