

SUSS STUDY AWARD FOR LAW (FOR LLB & JD STUDENTS)

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. The SUSS Study Award for Law is open to all current Bachelor of Laws (LLB) and Juris Doctor (JD) students.
- 2. Applicants must be Singapore citizens with financial needs and must achieve at least a cumulative Grade Point Average of 3.5 at point of study award application.
- 3. The value of each study award is S\$3,000 and will be used to offset against the tuition fees for the next immediate semester. It is awarded based on applicant's Gross Monthly Household Per Capita Income (PCI)¹ or Monthly Gross Household Income (GHI)², or evidence of financial difficulties.
- 4. Study award recipients are not required to serve a bond with SUSS but are expected to make satisfactory academic progress.
- 5. Study awards are accorded on a yearly basis. Applicants may apply for the study award in the academic year that they are in need.
- 6. The study award may not, without the prior approval of the University, be held concurrently with any other awards.
- 7. Applicants are required to submit all relevant supporting documents together with the study award e-application. Otherwise, the application would be considered incomplete and will not be processed.
- 8. Study award application must be submitted by the stipulated deadline. Recipients are not allowed to request for deferment of the study award.
- 9. Shortlisted candidates will be notified to attend an interview by end October.
- 10. The University reserves the right to revoke the study award at any time if, in its opinion, the recipient's conduct or academic performance has not been satisfactory.
- 11. The University reserves the right to amend the terms and conditions for the study award at its sole discretion without prior notice.
- 12. The decision of SUSS on the selection of study award candidates is final and no appeal will be entertained.

A separate letter and agreement with the detailed terms and conditions (including the above terms and conditions) and others relating to the course of study will be given to all successful applicants.

¹PCI refers to gross monthly household Per Capita Income (PCI) and is computed based on GHI divided by the number of immediate and non-immediate family members living in the same household.

²GHI refers to gross monthly household income of immediate and non-immediate family members, where:

For Unmarried Students:

Immediate family members include parents who may or may not be living together with the student. Non-immediate family members include grandparents, siblings, spouses of siblings, siblings of parents, and any other relatives living together with the student.

For Married Students:

Immediate family members include spouse and all children who may or may not be living together with the student. Non-immediate family members include parents, grandparents, siblings, spouses of siblings, siblings of parents, and any other relatives living together with the student.
